

DISCOVER THE bardessono AMERICA'S GREENEST LUXURY HOTEL & SPA A DELICIOUSLY RESTORATIVE RETREAT

The entry itself is a quiet celebration of the earth. Guests arriving at the Bardessono see a softly lit sign framed by rammed earth walls and artfully gnarled olive trees – century-old soldiers retired from a nearby working olive grove. You wind your way along the “upcycled” stone driveway and through a porte coché supported by towering pillars where a hostess awaits with a warm welcome.

Her digital tablet in hand, she is waiting specifically for you. As the valet parks your car, she greets you by name and deftly guides you through hand-milled recycled redwood doors into, not a lobby, but an oasis.

Vertical gardens created by Flora Grubb delight the eye as you take in a reception room filled with history. And there isn't a reservation desk in sight. You notice a sitting room with a fireplace clad in locally quarried Tufa stone that once cellared wine and produce in the Bardessono family home. It all feels sumptuous, like you are the intimate guest of a longtime friend.

A member of the Bardessono hospitality team takes your bags while your host guides you across a bricked pathway. You pass a slow-moving brook filled with sand and slate-colored stones from the Yuba River, cross a courtyard of olive trees flanking an impressive cascading fountain crafted from olive grinding wheels and suddenly you are standing at the door of your suite.

Once inside, your host hands you a digital tablet filled with your reservation information while someone tucks your bags in a floor-to-ceiling closet. A quick signature, the reservation process is finished, and you're left standing in your suite, awed. And that's just the beginning. General Manager Roger Young has seen to every detail.

When second-generation Napa Valley farmer Steve Bardessono approached eco-developer Phil Sherburne

with his family's legacy project, the pair shared a vision: to create a luxurious hotel that preserved the integrity of the Bardessono family's historic homestead and simultaneously opened it up to a flourishing tribe of travelers as enthusiastic about environmental preservation as they were.

Located on a historic five-acre property in the geographic center of Yountville, CA, the Bardessono hotel, restaurant and spa looks and feels like a rural

retreat. Winding paths, organic sculpture and beautiful common spaces connect a series of 62 guest suites and make those five acres seem wondrously, languorously sprawling. Magnolia trees frame a private northern courtyard, tributaries pass beneath bridges and sapling fruit trees dot the property's southern edge.

Natural beauty abounds in this contemporary design of stone, steel and cypress, redwood, orchard walnut and California bay woods. Marin County sawyer Evan Shively reclaimed the wood from within a 100-mile radius of the Napa Valley, making it an extension of the California landscape.

Beneath a small vineyard, 82 geothermal wells naturally heat and cool the entire resort. It is the largest geothermal system of any hotel in the world, according to Sherburne, and it is only one of a series of mind-blowing environmental initiatives that make Bardessono the most sophisticated green resort in the wine country.

And yet, this hotel is not just about keeping up eco-appearances. It's about nurturing each guest who passes through its courtyards. “Our hotel is dedicated to satisfying guests and their expectations,” Seattle architect and one of the Bardessono's chief designers Ron Mitchell says, “while at the same time delighting them again and again, whether that's through sitting under a tree while reading a book in a private courtyard, lunching with fellow guests at the common table in the dining room, swimming towards surrounding mountains in the rooftop pool, showering under the stars, or discovering natural tranquility within the town of Yountville.”

That's the magic of Bardessono. It reveals itself in layers. You cannot help, but notice how this sanctuary so quietly tucked into one of Napa Valley's most charming villages, allows guests the luxury of choosing to retreat from or engage in the traditions, foods and personalities

the surrounding community has to offer. You cannot help but feel warmed by the personal touches your host has added to your room, or the wine country adventure Guest Experience Director Cristina Salas-Porras has custom-designed for you.

When the lounge staff engages you in a dialogue regarding a single barrel brandy from California distiller Germain-Robin, you realize the Bardessono team took every detail into account: the hand-loomed Coyuchi linens and cult skincare products from In Fiore, green technology, steam showers and exterior Venetian blinds. Sherburne knew couples looking for an intimate getaway would delight in steam showers, 120-gallon bubble tubs for two, spaciouly situated his-and-hers vanities and basins. He knew sport enthusiasts and active families would take real delight in using the complimentary ultra-lightweight precision Orbea sport bikes to explore

the valley's abundant offerings. Or choose children's and town bikes for meandering about Yountville and along the old stage route at the north end of town.

Sherburne allied himself with MTM Luxury Lodging and over a dozen Pacific Northwest and California artists, artisans, craftsmen and super talents to handcraft these details. Every one of them shared his belief that hospitality would be the heart of the hotel and that the environmental initiatives were, simply, the right thing to do.

Together, they filled The Bardessono with those million subtle distinctions that give guests a truly authentic and restorative experience. The result is a Platinum-LEED aspiring hotel perfect for a 30th wedding anniversary celebration, a late afternoon lunch, or a quick espresso in the lounge. It's a 62 suite boutique where each room doubles as a spa and an unprecedented spa butler program brings an entire menu of services directly to its guests. It's a restaurant and lounge that honors Napa Valley's longstanding culinary traditions and produce whether Chef Sean O'Toole's is preparing Pacific Bay shellfish and local greens or mixologist Thad Vogler is whipping up cocktails of Chachaca and Prosecco mixed with fresh ginger and mint plucked from the hotel's organic gardens.

The result is the Bardessono, an unfolding oasis in the heart of the Napa Valley. NVL
